Questions: Should we celebrate Christmas as the birth of Christ? What should a Christian's attitude toward Christmas be?

Answers: We should always refrain from binding any religious observance which is not bound in the Scriptures. Certainly the birth of Christ, just as any other good event recorded in the Bible, is worthy of our study, is an appropriate subject for songs of praise, and is good for teaching. However, this is not the same as saying that a connection **ought** to be drawn between December 25 and the birth of Christ. It is easy to go to an extreme in either way, so let me list some things that should guide us in our study of this subject:

- 1) No one knows the day Christ was born, it's not a big deal, but it probably wasn't even near a cold December 25th. Just read the accounts in Matthew through John and see what you think.
- 2) We have authority to thank God for all good things (1 Thess. 5:18). This would certainly include the miraculous events surrounding the sending of Jesus to earth. Therefore, those beautiful songs about Jesus' birth are good for use as spiritual songs **throughout the year**. It is regrettable that it is only seen as appropriate to sing them at one time during the year.
- 3) It is undeniable that the Scripture spends far more time talking about the death and resurrection of Christ as opposed to His birth. I find it strange, then, that Christmas is seen as a bigger holiday than Easter. Especially since we know when Easter time is, but don't know when Christ was born! This just shows that Christmas is a cultural observance and not really religious in nature.

Let me summarize and give some guidelines from the Bible: We want everyone to have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. However, we cannot **bind** Christmas as a time to observe Christ's birth because God didn't bind it, we must stay within His authority (Col. 3:17). It is appropriate in general to praise God for sending Jesus to us; we can't say Jesus was born on December 25th. We should have the spirit of giving at all times and seasons.

The special observance of one day as a special **religious** day (when God has not called it so) causes confusion. Proof? Consider Zech. 7:3ff. In this passage the people had made a day on their own in which they would mourn or fast for Jerusalem, which had fallen to the Babylonians 70 years before. But from a reading of the passage we see that God did not count this for their righteousness. It was just something they did. If you keep reading, you find what God really wanted from the people: justice, mercy, etc. Christmas is similar in that it is easier for people to set aside a day than live for Him each day. May we give thanks unto God for the greatest gift of all at this time and at all times.
